January 12 – Michele Holt-Shannon – Life-giving conversations in a soul-bruising time, or, Loving conversations for a divided public life.

Michele Holt-Shannon is the director and co-founder of New Hampshire Listens at the UNH Carsey School of Public Policy. For over 30 years, her work on and off campus has focused on community problem-solving, increasing engagement in the decisions that impact people's lives, and bringing skills and support for navigating conflict and controversy. Michele is known for her skill in facilitating groups, coalitions, and learning exchanges.

Michele is a Senior Associate with Everyday Democracy and a 2018 Better Selves Knoll Farm Fellow. She is a graduate of Leadership New Hampshire, Class of 2013. Michele is a middle child from a mixed politics family. She earned her MA in higher education and human development from Bowling Green State University, an MTS in world religions and theological studies from Boston College, and a BS in biology and psychology from the University of Alabama.

January 19 – Dawn Meredith – A program honoring Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and his legacy.

This service will honor the legacy of Dr. King by amplifying the voices of our Black neighbors, past and present, as they have shared their deep personal experiences of white supremacy and racism in the US.

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Fellowship Financial Considerations

Members have commented that they would like to know what level of donations are necessary/appropriate for keeping the Fellowship running. Here is information that should shed some light on their question:

This year the **DUUF Operating Budget** calls for income of approximately \$47,000 in order to balance the books for the current fiscal year. Income comes from several sources including \$27,000 from our tenants and other users of our facility and \$1,500 from fundraisers and interest. The balance, \$18,500, is needed from member donations.

We currently have 44 active adult members in 32 households. We will meet this year's goal if donations are an average of \$420 per member or \$580 per household for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

As in the past, some can and will give more; others will do their best.

We appreciate all you do to help the Fellowship thrive!



The Six Sources Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote:

1. Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;

2. Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;

3. Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;

4. Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;

5. Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;

6. Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

The Seven Principles

Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote seven Principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. We live out these Principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from sources as diverse as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, "The Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities."

1st Principle: The inherent worth and dignity of every person; 2nd Principle: Justice, equity and compassion in human relations; 3rd Principle: Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations; 4th Principle: A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;

5th Principle: The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;

6th Principle: The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all; 7th Principle: Respect for the interdependent web of all


existence of which we are a part.

Unitarian Universalism is living tradition that has changed in many ways from the original Christian roots of its Universalist and Unitarian heritages, and it continues to evolve today. Most recently, this evolution has taken the form of adopting new language to describe who we are as UUs. At General Assembly in June 2024, UUs voted to replace existing Seven Principles and Six Sources language in our bylaws with language describing Unitarian Universalism through these shared values:

Interdependence: We honor the interdependent web of all existence and acknowledge our place in it.

Pluralism: We are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and theology.

Justice: We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all feel welcome and can thrive.

Transformation: We adapt to the changing world.

Generosity: We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.

Equity: We declare that every person is inherently worthy and has the right to flourish with dignity, love, and compassion.
